Procedures to Report Criminal Acts or Emergencies on Campus

Any emergency situation involving a threat to life or property should be immediately reported to the University Police. The caller should stay on the line until the dispatcher terminates the call. Do not hang up. Emergency police, fire or medical assistance can be obtained by calling 9-1-1. All campus phones, including pay phones may be used to dial 9-1-1 at no charge. All other business can be conducted by calling **974-2628**.

Emergency Blue Light Phones are located throughout campus and are equipped with automatic location indicators and have instruction for the hearing and speaking impaired.

Campus Sexual Assault Policy

The USF Police Department is responsible for the investigation of campus sexual offenses. The USF Police Department provides immediate assistance to the victim and initiates investigative processes to apprehend the perpetrator of the crime. The USF Police Department works closely with the Hillsborough County State Attorney's Office in all investigations of sexual battery/rape investigations.

Complaints of sexual battery/rape are serious criminal offenses that will be processed within the criminal justice system. Sexual battery/rape committed by students is also a violation of the USF student conduct rule. Student perpetrators are subject to institutional disciplinary sanctions including expulsion as provided by the USF rules in addition to those stated above in accordance with

Campus related sexual battery/rape committed by employees is also considered misconduct as provided by applicable rules and collective bargaining agreements. Employee perpetrators are subject to institutional disciplinary action including termination as provided by such rules/agreements in addition to those stated above in accordance with State law.

Rights of Victims of Campus Related Sexual Batteries.

The University understands and commits its efforts toward successfully dealing with the trauma experienced by victims of sexual battery/rape. Efforts will be directed toward assisting the victim at all stages of the investigation and judicial process that may follow. The same shall be accorded to victims in connection with disciplinary actions involving alleged employee perpetrators subject to applicable rules and collective bargaining agreements. USF policies dictate that:

- The right to request a University directive forbidding the alleged perpetrator from contact with the victim
- The right to request an immediate change in residence hall arrangements and/or transfer of classes/workplaces
- The right to have present throughout the disciplinary process an advisor, which may also be a legal counsel.
- The right to remain present during the entire hearing.
- · The right to have irrelevant sexual history excluded from the hearing.
- The right to submit a list of related questions for consideration prior to the hearing.
- The right to submit a victim impact statement.
- The right to know the outcome of the proceeding.

Victim's Advocacy Program

The Victim's Advocacy Program will assist USF students or employees who are victims of actual or threatened violence including assault, battery, sexual battery and attempted sexual battery. Services are available 24 hours a day, seven days a week.

Victim services include assistance in contacting professors or supervisors about absences, assistance with referrals and follow-up medical treatment and counseling services on and off campus; assistance with immediate changes in residence hall arrangements if needed for victims living on campus: assistance with immediate safe housing; transportation and assistance in disciplinary proceedings and/or the criminal justice system. Follow-up counseling services or other trauma assistance will be arranged for the victim as needed.

While reports are strongly encouraged, reports are not required for information and referral assistance. The Victims' Advocate telephone number is

974-5757 and is located in ADM 273. Office hours are Monday through Friday 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. An on-call advocate can be reached anytime by contacting the program telephone number at 974-5757.

The Counseling Center for Human Development provides professional counseling services to USF students. These services include: intake evaluation, shortterm personal counseling, psychiatric consultation, group counseling and referral services.

For more information or an appointment, call 974-2831. The offices are located in the Student Services Building, SVC 2124. Office hours are 8 a.m. to 5 p.m., Monday through Friday. Emergency, after hours services can be obtained by contacting the University Police at 974-2628.

Employee Assistance Program

The Employee Assistance Program provides professional counseling and referral services for USF employees. The services offered include: intake evaluation, short-term personal counseling and referral

Student Health Services

Student Health Services functions as a walk-in clinic for students and maintains a day infirmary only. Services include on-site nurses and physicians, a variety of lab tests and specialty clinics (including GYN).

The Student Health Services Building is located east of the University Center and north of the Student Services annex. The telephone number is 974-2331 and the hours are 8:30 am. to 5:00 p.m., Monday through Friday.



Residential Officers

Crime Prevention Programs

The University Police Department encourages all students and members of the faculty and staff to be involved in campus crime prevention. Information on safety and security concerns and precautions are provided to students, faculty, staff members regularly through seminars, films, bulletins, crime alerts, posters, brochures and university staff and student newspapers. In an on-going effort to facilitate this process. University Police officers provide crime prevention programs each semester on the following topics:

- Rape Aggression Defense (RAD) (Self Defense for Women)
- Personal Safety Reducing Your Risks Drinking and Driving – DUI Information
- Drugs Health Risks, Liabilities
- Burglary and Theft Prevention

- Who we are and What we do
- Bike Engraving and Theft Prevention
- Cash Handling and Robbery Precautions
- Child Safety Programs
- Violence in the Workplace Alcohol Programs

Additional programs are provided by the University to include:

- The Campus Alcohol and Drug Resource Center sponsors National Collegiate Alcohol Awareness Week in the Fall and National Collegiate Drug Awareness Week in the Spring.
- Mandatory Orientation programming for all new students includes a session on Campus Safety and another on Wellness issues. Through these programs, student awareness is increased about health and safety issues for their personal life.
- · The Health Education Department offers a variety of outreach programming which includes: Introduction to Women's Health;

Sexually Transmitted Diseases; Substance Abuse Awareness and Sexuality: and AIDS Education.

Security of Campus Facilities/ Residence Halls

The University of South Florida is a public institution and, with the exception of residence halls, is open to the public during the day and evening hours when classes are in session. After these hours, University buildings are generally locked and only faculty, staff and some students with proper identification are admitted. University Police provide regular patrol of University buildings as well as parking lots.

Prevention Services/ Education Programs

Resident students are issued a key at check-in so they may have access to their living unit. Students are encouraged to safeguard keys in order to enhance their personal safety and the safety of others. An effective residence hall security system program depends upon resident cooperation, staff supervision and University Police assistance. The best security system is one in which every member of the community takes personal responsibility for self-protection and the protection of their property.

University Police (UP) officers regularly patrol the residence halls and are readily available to assist on a 24-hour basis. The University Police Department also has a satellite office in the residential area with two officers assigned to the residential facilities to specifically deal with the needs of residential students. A Resident Assistant or Night Clerk is on duty in residence hall complexes every night for security purposes. These security measures and personnel are representative of our concern for the protection of your person and property. Maintenance personnel make security inspections and corrections as needed. Students are encouraged to call the housing office or the police department to promptly report security deficiencies.

The Physical Plant Division maintains University buildings and grounds with a concern for the safety and and security of all persons and property. Inspections are routinely conducted and repairs are promtly made to ensure that appropriate safety and security standards are maintained. The University Police Department assists Physical Plant personnel by reporting potential safety and security hazards which include conducting campus lighting surveys and reporting outages. Students, faculty and staff are also encouraged to call Physical Plant to report any safety or security hazards.

A representative of the University Police department is involved in the review of architectural plans for new facilities or major renovations to existing buildings. Specific recommendations are made to enhance the security of all facilities before contractors begin working. The University Police Department also conducts physical security surveys of campus facilities that may be vulnerable to criminal intrusion. Specific recommendations are made regarding security hardware, alarms or procedures that will serve to reduce the opportunities for crime to occur in or around campus buildings.

USF's Drug Free Schools and Community Program The University of South Florida is committed to

providing an orderly and safe environment for all students, faculty and employees. To this end, the University advises all community members that it is unlawful to manufacture, distribute, dispense, possess and/or use illegal drugs on its premises. Any violation may be cause for disciplinary action and criminal prosecution. (Please refer to: USF, A Drug-Free Workplace and University of South Florida Student Handbook.)

The use of alcoholic beverages by members of the University Community is at all times subject to the alcoholic beverage laws of the State of Florida and USF Alcohol Policy and Guidelines. Specifically, it is unlawful for any person to sell, give, serve or permit to be served alcoholic beverages to a person under 21 years-of-age or to consume said beverages on licensed premises. It is also unlawful for a peron to misrepresent or misstate his or her age or the age of any other person for the purpose of inducing any license or his agents or employees to sell, give, serve or deliver any alcoholic beverage to a person under 21 years-of-age. A violation of the proceeding may be cause for disciplinary action and criminal prosecution.

Drug and Alcohol Counseling

Programs are available to assist students and employees who may be in need of drug or alcohol counseling and treatment or rehabilitation programs. The Counseling Center receives referrals from Housing, the Student Health Services, Campus Alcohol and Drug Resource Center, DUI Counter Attack School, Student Affairs administration, University Police and self-referrals from individuals for alcohol and drug related problems.

The Counseling Center provides psychological assessment and screening, short-term treatment of appropriate cases or referral to other treatment resources as needed. An Employee Assistance Program (EAP) is available in the Counseling Center for faculty or staff who may be experiencing drug or alcohol related difficulties. Supervisors may refer staff members or individuals may independently contact EAP.

Florida State Statute 790.06(12) forbids any person from carrying a firearm on a university campus. Firearms are not allowed in USF housing facilities. To assist persons who may desire to have access to firearms for recreational purposes, the University Police Department provides weapon(s) storage.

Lakeland Campus

The University has a campus located at Polk Community College in Lakeland. Law enforcement services, including the investigation of criminal acts, are provided on a routine basis by the Polk County Sheriff's Office in Lakeland. The University Police Department provides law enforcement or crime prevention services at this location on an as needed basis. The Polk county Sheriff's Office advised that no required reportable offenses occurred on or about the USF Lakeland campus property in 2000.

Off-Campus Student Residence

At the Tampa campus, many of our students live in privately owned fraternity houses or apartments located near the campus. The local law enforcement agency of jurisdiction is responsible for providing police services to these students. The University Police Department offers crime prevention programs emphasizing security measures that these residents can take to protect

The University Police initiates regular contact with local law enforcement agencies regarding criminal activity occurring at off-campus student housing complexes. The University Police Department meets regularly with the managers of off-campus housing complexes to discuss specific concerns and recommendations for improving security precautions.

The University Police Department annually provides the Student Government sponsored Off-Campus Housing Office with a brochure which assists students in evaluating the security of off-campus apartments. This brochure identifies high crime rate areas, security features that should be available in off campus complexes, steps for forming a neighborhood watch group and other basic prevention precautions.

Crime Statistics

The University Police Department submits semiannual Uniform Crime Report data to the Florida Department of Law Enforcement for the three campuses that have University Police personnel assigned (Tampa, St. Petersburg and Sarasota). They also regularly disseminate information concerning the incidence of crime through local and on-campus media. The data is ultimately published by the FBI in the Uniform Crime Report. The charts listed on the following page, reflects the number of crimes reported for select offenses as required by federal law. Florida Department of Law Enforcement definitions of the select offenses is available by contacting the University Police Department.

POLICE DEPARTMENT

The crimes reported on each chart are separated by campus and identify the four locations in each area where the crimes occurred. The locations are identified as: on-campus, either in the residential area (Res) or other areas of the campus (othr); non-campus building or property, which are the buildings owned or controlled by the University or a student organization recognized by the University and used by students but not in the geographic area of the campus; public property, which is property contiguous to the University.

THEFT Tips . . .

Theft is the biggest crime problem facing the university community. Most thefts can be prevented or made more difficult if attention is paid to the following:

- Be certain that all doors are not a thief's best friend. Even if you are going out for only a few minutes . . . **Lock Your Door!**
- At night all office equipment both personal and the University's should be placed in a locked desk or cabinet whenever possible. Items such as typewriters and computers should be bolted to desks. Money and stamps should be stored in a locked cash box which is kept inside a locked cabinet or
- Each office should have an inventory of both the University's and personal effects that are kept on the premises. Serial numbers and USF I.D. numbers should be recorded because they make recovery and identification of stolen items easier. An up-to-date record of all equipment out on repair, out on loan, or replaced should be kept.
- · When in libraries or other public places (dining halls, University Center and the like), backpacks, books, purses and wallets should not be left unattend ed, even for a few minutes. In the time it takes to get a book or a meal, a purse or wallet can be stolen easily. Faculty and staff members should lock purses and other valuables in their desks. Valuable items should never be left out in the open.

TEXTBOOK RECOVERY

 In addition to writing your name in your textbook, pick a special page and write your drivers license number in the margin. Do this with every book you own. If your book(s) are stolen, report this to the University Police immediately. Then notify the Book-Buy-Back areas. The results are you have a good chance of getting your books back and a book thief will be identified and apprehended.

BICYCLE RECOVERY

- The more expensive and attractive your bicycle is, the more likely it is to be stolen. A mechanically sound, generic appearing bicycle is a less likely target.
- · Lock your bike.
- The best protection for your bike is to secure it properly with a hardened steel "U-shaped lock".
- If your bike is missing call the University Police immediately.
- To assist in the recovery, you should record the serial number and keep in your wallet, engrave your driver's license number on the frame and register your bike with Parking Services.
- The USFPD Crime Prevention Unit will gladly assist with engraving your bike, choosing the right lock and registering your bike. All of these services are FREE. For an appointment call, 974-2771.

Wear a Helmet

Nearly 75% of all bicycle related deaths are the result of head injuries. Children under age 16 are required to wear helmets.

- Make Yourself Visible Night Riding Nearly 60% of all adult fatal bicycle accidents in Florida occur during twilight and nighttime hours even though only 3% of bicycle usage takes place during that time period. While riding between sunset and sunrise the law requires the use of a lamp on the front of the bicycle exhibiting a white light visible from a distance of 500 ft, and a lamp on the rear exhibiting a red light visible from a distance of 600 ft, to the rear.
- Observe Traffic Laws, Signs and Signals In the state of Florida, the bicycle is legally defined as a vehicle. Bicyclists have the same rights and duties on the roadway, and must obey the same traffic laws, as an operator of any other vehicle.
- Bicycle laws you may not have known:
- No bicycle may be used to carry more than one person at a time than the number for which the bicycle is designed or equipped.
- Any person operating a bicycle shall keep at least one hand upon the handlebars.
- No person shall operate a bicycle while wearing a headset or other listening device, other than a hearing aid.

Please Bike Safely

- While biking at USF, play it safe.
- USF sees a higher percentage of crashes at the beginning of semesters.
- Most of USF's crashes occur between noon and 6:00 p.m.
- Over 50% of USF bike crashes were during transition from sidewalk to crosswalk.
- You must not jet out into traffic.
- Never ride against traffic.
- Bicvclists who ride against traffic on the wrong side of the road remove themselves from the normal scanning patterns of other vehicle operators.
- Bicyclists are found at fault in half of crashes at USF.
- 70% of the time bicyclists require medical assistance.

Prohibited areas include:

- Any area within 6 feet in front and to the side of any entrance to or exit from a
- Within any sidewalk, access or egress ramp, steps or stairs and corridors.
- In motor vehicle parking spaces.
- Bicycles attached to handrails on handicap access ramps will be impounded, as well as those parked as to present a hazard to general pedestrian traffic. Owners will be fined upon reclaiming impounded bicycles.

BE AWARE

When jogging be aware of people around you, and

- Try to avoid running alone, even in daylight.
- Stay on well-lighted paths in open areas. Vary your route.
- Be suspicious of people who pass many times. Don't wear earphones.

When you are in your car . . .

- Park in a well-lighted area at night. Pay for parking. Check the street before leaving the car.
- Walk to your car with keys ready.
- Check the back seat before entering. Someone could be hiding there.
- While driving, keep the doors locked so no one can jump in at a red light.
- Keep enough gas in your tank for emergencies.
- If you are followed by another car, drive to a police station or business with lights and people. Do not go home with someone following you.
- If your car breaks down, lift the hood put on the flashers and wait inside for help with the doors locked.
- Ask people who stop to call the police or AAA. Keep an envelope with change and phone numbers to call and slip it through a partially opened window to someone wanting to help.

When you are in an elevator . . .

- Trust your intuition. If you feel uncomfortable, you do not have to get on or may get off.
- Stand near the controls. If necessary, you can press all the buttons or use the emergency alarm.

University of South Florida has established standards of conduct concerning the possession, sale, serving and consumption of alcoholic beverages and drugs on the University of South Florida campus. These policies and rules reflect a concern for the health and safety of the campus community and apply to University faculty, students, staff, visitors and guests.

 State of Florida statutes dictate that it is unlawful for a person under 21 years of age to possess or consume alcoholic beverages. Consequently, anyone under the legal drinking age may not consume, distribute or possess alcohol on University properties or as part of any University Activity.

It is unlawful to sell, give, serve or permit alcoholic beverages to be served to anyone under 21 years of age.

Furthermore, servers can be held civilly liable for damage caused by underage drinkers to whom they provided alcoholic beverages.

- It is unlawful to be under the influence of, use, possess, distribute, sell or agree to sell, or represent to sell narcotics, hallucinogens, dangerous drugs, or controlled substances, except as where permitted by prescriptions or law.
- · Violations of these laws are dealt with in both criminal prosecution and with administrative sanctions, including permanent expulsion from the University of South Florida.
