GREETINGS FROM THE DIRECTOR

We encourage you to recognize and celebrate our student success, as the Student Support Services Program (SSS) has undeniably experienced another successful year. For the rst time in our 32+ year history, SSS participants attained a six year graduation rate of 74 percent, compared to the national average of 59 percent for the 2010 cohort. SSS participants attained a four year graduation rate of 49 percent, compared to the national average 44 percent for the 2012 cohort.

Currently 97 percent of our 220 participants are in good academic standing. Our department continues to focus on the University of South Florida's (USF) preeminence goals and the grant requirements for the Federal Department of Education. SSS partners with various university

In addition, Huntley is a member of the Mobilizing the Dream committee that is tasked with working with faculty and administration to enhance the black student experience at USF. Huntley also has extensive experience as a volunteer tutor for young children and he is planning the Southeastern Black Unity Conference that he founded as a way to network with other college students throughout the region.

In addition, Huntley was recently elected as the 2017-18 President of the Black Student Union and he hopes to raise the pro le and membership of this student organization. Huntley is also a newly inducted member of lota Phi Theta Fraternity, Incorporated, and he is looking forward to making positive and signicant contributions to their brotherhood. All of these activities demonstrate Huntley's commitment to enhancing USF through leadership and service. These experiences are also preparing Huntley for his future career in College Student Affairs, where his goal is to become a Dean of Students at the collegiate level. His experience at USF has greatly affected his career choice because he has discovered that he loves being extremely involved on campus and having in uence over programming activities. Huntley sincerely cares about enhancing the college student experience for every student and he looks forward to doing so as a college administrator in the future.

Huntley chose to attend USF because he saw the many resources that are available to him as a student, and he was also impressed with how many accolades and accomplishments the university has achieved in its short history. While already accomplishing so much himself at USF, Huntley hopes to grow into being a great leader and an in-uential mentor that other students can look up to. 
SSS Students are Global Citizens

Bulls Interns



Alexandra Pellot, Sophomore, Psychology: "Our week consisted of workshops and training's to introduce us to the work Campus Pride is doing here in Charlotte, NC and across the country. Once we were trained we got to work. We were divided into groups working on an organization strategic review project, auction preparation, and social media research. Throughout the week, we were visited by local LGBTQ community leaders who taught us about gender identity, activism in the wake of HB2, queer history, and advocating for sexual health. We also visited the Campus Pride of ce to learn more about working for a non-pro t organization. We stayed up late to watch documentaries like The Trans List and even saw a drag show. This trip was an eye opening journey on how we, together can create more inclusive spaces on campus and within our community."

Adela Lopez, Freshman, Pre-Marketing: "This year I had the tremendous privilege of being a part of Bulls Service Break with the topic on Immigration. Heading to Texas I had a broad idea of what we were going to do. I have always been really aware with most things that had to do with immigration since it is a topic that hit really close to home. We went to learn more about it and lend a hand in any way we can. On our rst day we drove to LUPE at San Juan a neighboring city. We helped clean up the classroom around LUPE, which is a place that many undocumented families go to for support from legal to helping them prepare for their citizens or DACA or Residency paper work. That same day, our facilitator Mary, took us to see the border for our rst time. Being at the border we learned her personal story and struggles to be in the United States, it was a very powerful moment. It was sad to know that the only people helping out these families are foundations like LUPE who ght for their rights every day. More than me making an impact in Texas, I truly feel like Texas made a bigger impact on me. I would most de nitely recommend this trip to anyone who is thinking about it. It will open your eyes and change you as a person."




